We appreciate the financial constraints on students in Higher Education and we do not insist on the purchase of textbooks. The following book may serve to assist you throughout your programme should you consider purchasing a text book:

- Additional reference material for all modules will be given during the programme.

The food premises used by FST students in practicals are registered food premises, as such all students will need to complete the appropriate Food Industry Centre induction to undertake practical classes. This will be undertaken during induction week with refresher sessions prior to the commencement of relevant modules.

Students are required to wear the appropriate protective clothing in all practical classes to meet the legislative requirements.

You will require a suitable white food industry standard protective coat. This type of coat is distinguished by its essential characteristics i.e. no buttons, concealed stud popper front, no external pockets and preferably no internal pockets above the waistline. You are required to provide this coat for food practicals, if you do not you will be marked as not attending. Single use disposable Food Coats are available from the Food technicians for a cost of £1.00 each, which makes the purchase of a washable coat the cheaper option for the duration of the course.

Food Industry Standard Hair and beard covers are provided free for all practical classes that require them.

For some practical classes, you will work in the high care section of the Food Industry Centre (FIC), and on these occasions, you will be provided with suitable protective clothing at no cost to yourself.

All science laboratory coats will be provided. We shall also provide the correct protective clothing for the microbiology laboratory, at each practical session.

Where factory visits are undertaken a contribution to the transport costs may be levied and students may be responsible for any admission charges e.g. exhibitions.

During your studies there may be other costs for printing and research. However, costs for printing final year dissertations, posters for some modules and some costs incurred for dissertation research (excluding travel) will be met by the department

Sport Kit Order

Once you have enrolled online, you will be sent information about ordering a free Cardiff School of Sport and Health Sciences kit package. Please place your order online prior to arrival should you want to. You will be able to collect your kit on campus during your Induction Week.

3. Enrolment / Student MetCard Collection

Enrolment is an important process which confirms your status as a Student. You can complete the online self enrolment process from any computer through our Self Service system. Please note that in order to self enrol; your status must be Unconditional Firm (UF)

You will receive an email notifying you when you are eligible to enrol online. The email will direct you to a password reset facility in order to request a password to be able to login and complete the enrolment process. For information and guidance on this process please make sure you visit our enrolment page – www.cardiffmet.ac.uk/enrolment.

This process is essential in that it will allow you access to your student loan (if applied for), payment of fees, Cardiff Met's IT systems and importantly enable you to obtain your Student MetCard. A scheduled time for collection of your Metcard is stated within your Induction Week timetable.

You will be able to access your Programme Handbook via Moodle once you have completed your online enrolment and have access to the Cardiff Met's IT systems. More information will be available once you have completed your enrolment.

Enrolment for International Students from outside the EU

If you are an international student (from outside the EU) you **will not** be required to enrol online before arriving at Cardiff Met. This is because it is a legal requirement for the university to check immigration documents of international students before they are permitted to enrol onto their courses. Library & Information Services

You will have access to Cardiff Met's Library & Information Services soon after completing your online enrolment. A confirmation email will be sent to you with your Cardiff Met login details. To see the facilities and services available, please refer to www.cardiffmet.ac.uk/library.

Your Student MetCard

Cardiff Met have introduced a photo upload facility for online enrolment, which can then be used on your Student MetCard. This facility is optional. Alternatively, your photo will be taken at the time you collect your Student MetCard. If you have chosen to use the photo upload facility, you will need to bring photo ID with you when collecting your Student MetCard.

Fees

If you are classed as a 'Home' or EU student, your course fees for September 2019 entry have been set at £9,000 and more information about fees can be found here. If your course has any additional costs attached to it, they will be listed on www.cardiffmet.ac.uk/additionalcosts. You should already be aware of these costs.

4. Induction Week Timetable

Your first semester as a new student starts with Induction Week, where you will settle into your accommodation, course and student life. Your Induction Week timetable is a schedule of events designed to familiarise you with Cardiff Met, its facilities and your fellow students. You will be given the chance to attend a range of events covering your course, library services, IT, student services and students union. You will also meet, and have a number of sessions, with your personal tutor to make your academic transition as smooth as possible.

There is the Freshers Fayre where you can sign up to a number of different societies and clubs, and the MetFest social event on Friday afternoon.

If you are new to Cardiff, there will also be plenty of opportunities for you explore the city, make new friends and settle into your new life.

Induction is a big occasion on campus and everyone gets involved. Don't be afraid to stop and ask - all of the staff and students are happy to welcome anyone new on campus.

5. Draft Timetable / Typical Attendance

Whilst I appreciate that there are many other calls on your time, I cannot over-emphasise the need for regular attendance in order to pass the modules and attain a good degree at the end of your course.

There are typically 25 hours of class contact a week, consisting of lectures delivered to the whole group and seminars or workshops, in which students are split into smaller groups. The structure of these will depend on the module, but in general they involve group discussions of topics and interactive problem solving exercises or students presenting previously prepared work to their peers and a member of staff. In addition, some modules have practical laboratory sessions

We will provide you with a more detailed timetable as soon as possible, but if you have any specific problems or issues, please contact the Programme Director and we will do our best to accommodate them.

NB: Timetables are subject to change, right up to and including the start of term.

As a first year student, you will have access to your confirmed timetable from Induction Week, which is prior to the first week of teaching.

Please note that you will need to be enrolled before you can access this information. If your place has been confirmed but you have not been notified that you can enrol, please contact Admissions on what to do next.
